Neighborhoods are being revitalized by Memphians who rethink existing spaces and investments are being made to improve our city. Take, for example, Crosstown Concourse: an abandoned Sears distribution center that sat dormant since 1993, reimagined into a vertical urban village of retailers, non-profits, a school, and restaurants all in a blighted neighborhood. Consider the \$9 billion expansion of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital into the Pinch District, or the rebirth of the Chisca Hotel and Tennessee Brewery for residential and commercial space, or the \$40 million invested in downtown Memphis to connect our citizens to the Soul of the City. That's the trend we're setting in this city – working together to build a better Memphis one person, place, and idea at a time and embracing every possibility to better our communities for everyone.

We recognize that not everyone in Memphis is born with the best opportunities to succeed, and we challenge and disrupt that fact with our philanthropic gestures and non-profits. Among the 50 largest regions in the U.S., Memphis is ranked #1 in the number of non-profit organizations per 10,000 population, and almost 60% of the are working to crack our hardest problems by serving low-income and disadvantaged populations. Memphians work year-round to support the people and programs within this city, lending their time, talent, money, innovation, and hearts. This commitment to generosity and spirit of community is what make Memphis, Memphis, so it's no surprise that Chronicle of Philanthropy named Memphis the most giving city in America.
